

#### THANK GOD AHEAD OF TIME!

Last week, I had the chance to attend together with Deacon Bill our Archdiocesan FALL CLERGY RETREAT. Even I was the only quite young priest there, the desire to attend was to be together with our senior clergy, to learn something from their wisdom and their role that impact us, young clergy. They have the wisdom of experience! They don't only think themselves into a new way of living but also a new way of thinking; their rising and falling from their pastoral experience in their priesthood ministry have been for them the mercy and compassion of God! Humbly, they learn this pattern of seeing in non-dualistic way. Besides, I admire their bold and audacious sharing of their experience, their inner bondage where God allows their failings into moments of grace. As Christians, we often ignore the message proclaimed which is central to our faith, our own daily falling and rising. At least, I felt this when I sung last year the EXULTET at the Easter Vigil absorbed by the line – "the happy fault" that heralds and compels the promise of Christ's salvation". Parishioners from all other parts of the world including our St. Isidore Parish will attend. What a beautiful blessing to have another humble person to be included on the list of the "cloud of witnesses". From this holy man we learned a lot of the wisdom of God. After listening patiently to the pilgrims' story, Father Solanus responds with his typical simple wisdom: "Thank God ahead of time!" He counsels everybody not to let sadness and worry frustrate the designs of the compassionate and merciful God. In its place, one should thank God now for the good He would certainly do for them. That's the faith at the moment when Father Solanus will say: "You're going to be all right."

We thank God ahead of time and we're almost at the end of the month! November leads us into Advent in a few weeks after THANKSGIVING, which is a time to prepare for the coming of Christ at Christmas. 

#### SCRIPTURE STUDY

#### AND THE LIGHT GOES ON

Last week I wrote about how I would like to follow my dad's example of dealing with the frustrations in life. I still have a long way to go before anyone would compare me to my dad, but I am trying to work at it. As I look back during this month of November, there is another man in my life who had a profound influence. Mr. Mancini was my 8th grade math teacher. I was ok in arithmetic up until the last part of the 8th grade. It was here that I hit a stumbling block; adding and subtracting fractions, simple and compound. I was on the verge of failing math because I just could not make sense of adding  $2^{3}$ 4 + 4 15/16 and arriving at 7 9/16. So, one day I asked Mr. Mancini if I could come by after school and have him help me with these troublesome fractions. He did stay with me, patiently guiding me through (and over and over again) the processes. After I had been there for two hours, he called my mom to explain why I wasn't home from school yet, and that he would drive me home later. Finally, after 6pm (school let out at 2:45) something clicked, the light went on and everything he was trying to explain became clear! By the end of the year I went from failing math to a C+.

I never considered myself "slow" or "stupid". I had the typical pre-adolescent recriminations of one who was in the 8th grade and physically the smallest kid in the school (boys or girls). I was awkward with girls and always the last picked (actually stuck with) any sports team in school. But, I never thought of myself as a slow learner; I was just stuck at a particular point. When the light finally went on, I quickly made up a lot of lost ground. And I was (and I still am) grateful that a teacher was patient enough to allow me the time, to make an effort to understand an important part of mathematics: fractions. Many years later, I was student teaching in an 8th grade math class and I had a student that could not wrap her mind around the idea that (4+7+1+3) - (5)+ 2) = (6+2). None of the numbers matched. I worked with her for two whole class days trying to get her to see that 4+7+3 = 15, and 5+2 = 7, and 15-7 = 8. Finally on the third day, something clicked in her mind and she understood! By the end of the year she had almost caught up with her class. (What happened with her after that year, I do not know.)


Sometimes we can get so frustrated with people because they "just don't get it!" Sometimes we can have an inflated opinion of our ability to "get it". In math, it is much easier to defend an answer, it is either right or it isn't. Unfortunately, we cannot simply reduce every life experience or every idea to some mathematical formulae and derive a "right" or a "wrong". So, perhaps we might learn to patiently work with one another, listen with an open mind and a willingness to learn until the "light goes on"!

November hosts the International Survivors of Suicide Day. Although

is it such a difficult topic, it is one that needs to be addressed. Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the US, therefore making it a top health concern.



- The annual age-adjusted suicide rate is 13.26 per 100,000 individuals.
- Men die by suicide 3.5x more often than women.
- On average, there are 121 suicides per day.
- White males accounted for 7 of 10 suicides in 2015.
- Firearms account for almost 50% of all suicides.
- The rate of suicide is highest in middle age white men in particular.

Stigma surrounding suicide leads to underreporting, and data collection methods critical to suicide prevention need to be improved. The survivors of suicide need support.

The single most important and helpful thing you can do as a friend is listen. Actively listen, without judgment, criticism or prejudice, to what the survivor is telling you. Because of the stigma surrounding suicide, survivors are often hesitant to openly share their story and express their feelings. In order to help, you must overcome any preconceptions you have about suicide and the suicide victim. This is best accomplished by educating yourself about suicide and its aftermath, survivors and their loved ones are in great pain and in need of your compassion.

Ask the survivor if and how you can help. They may not be ready to share and may want to grieve privately before accepting help. Let them talk at their own pace; they will share with you when (and what) they are ready to. Be patient. Repetition is part of healing; you may hear the same story multiple times. Use the loved one's name instead of 'he' or 'she'. The use of the decedent's name will be comforting.

You may not know what to say, and that's okay. Your presence and unconditional listening is what a survivor is looking for.

#### ST. ISIDORE PARISH FAMILY

Earlier this year, we broke ground on Our Lady of Fatima church in my village in Pakistan. Creating this church has been a dream of mine since I was ordained to the priesthood in September 3rd 1993. Our people have lacked a place of worship where they can celebrate the Liturgy and receive the Sacraments. Currently, they attend Mass in the homes of villagers each week. Besides providing a facility to celebrate the Eucharist, our new church will also provide vital outreach services to villagers by serving as a child-care center and an educational center. I have just returned from a trip to my village to check on the construction of our new church. The progress we have made has been amazing. We have completed the bricks and mortar on the outside of the church -- all with volunteer labor. The church means so much to people that they have dedicated their time and talent to help with the construction. God has truly blessed us with this effort. The land was donated, eager and devoted volunteers did the heavy lifting to build the church, and we received significant cash contributions from generous donors to pay for the supplies. As we enter the home stretch, we are putting the finishing touches on the church as we work towards its dedication in 2018. But we need additional funding to complete the electrical work on the interior and add modest accompaniments such as carpeting and church furniture. Your support will help bring the Gospel in a formal fashion to my villagers who are poor but who are filled with the Word of God. Thank you for your consideration.


