This change will also accommodate some parishioners' work schedules. Those who may travel out of town for the weekend, such as to visit their cottage, will be able to return home in time for this Mass. It will also serve those who are out late at a social function on Saturday night, such as a family wedding, who may find it difficult to participate well in Mass on Sunday morning. For some, Sunday is the one morning they can sleep in and just relax.

Based on the experience of other parishes which celebrate a Sunday evening Mass, it will also help serve our young families, who form a large segment of our parish. As we well know, there are extraordinarily great demands placed on our families these days. In fact, the daily demands of family life are so great that young parents often lack the time and energy to nurture their spiritual lives, and those of their children. In most cases, it is not a matter of priorities. It's just the reality of family life in our society. In some cases, Sunday evening may be a better time for our young families to "CONNECT, REACH, BUILD."

We will carefully monitor and evaluate the value of this change. In the meantime we ask for your prayers and support. In the coming weeks, we will be making an effort to recruit liturgical ministers to serve at this Mass. If you foresee yourself participating in this Mass on a somewhat regular basis, you may want to come forward to serve in one of the liturgical ministries. Pray over it.

I thank our Worship Commission and our Parish Staff for their work in implementing this decision of the Pastoral Council.

ARE "LEGAL" AND "RIGHT" EQUAL?

The presumption of legitimate disobedience is the cornerstone through which our nation was built upon. Our Declaration of Independence specifically identifies the right and obligation to reject and resist illegitimate authority. (When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation... opening argument in the Declaration of Independence.) The strict adherence to following a "law" simply on the basis of its existence is not supported in natural or juridical law, if a "law" is considered "morally corrupt". To argue against this fundamental principle is (to me) to argue that those people who offer shelter and protection persecuted people should be prosecuted and because the "law" at that time demanded such. Oskar Schindler, in this case then, is no hero, he is a criminal! The family that hid the Frank family (Ann Frank and her family) were not heroes, they were criminals who refused to "obey the law"! And God was wrong to direct Moses to set up "Sanctuary Cities" (Num 35:6-14; Joshua 20:2). Today, here in Michigan, here in Macomb County, there are Americans advocating for the arrest and conviction of those who would dare to violate the law and offer sanctuary to "illegal residents". These "Illegal residents" are those whose only "crime" is that they got here without "permission" or through legal processes. Some people use the argument that "terrorists" enter countries illegally. And, I believe that some terrorists do enter countries illegally. However, the terror attacks in Europe were predominantly planned by and carried out by legalized citizens (some even born in the country) and not infiltrators. There are some families facing deportation to "homes" where they will be executed for the mere "crime" of escaping the first time; families seeking safety from corrupt governments, drug lords, and hopeless poverty. Our American history doesn't substantiate the fear or the presumption of eminent danger from immigrants. Our very country was founded by people across Europe fleeing religious and economic persecutions. There are millions of refugees from Viet Nam, Cuba, Eastern Europe who are solid and faithful citizens who often entered our country illegally. There are many born here in America whose parents or grandparents were not the "first" to enter the United States. There are millions of people of Irish, Polish, German, Romanian, heritage who are results of "chain" migration. I doubt that there is a family without a "criminal" somewhere in their background. It is not inconceivable that people who have entered our country legally, born here who have committed violent and evil crimes. I am deeply offended by commercials on TV touting a "fear" of chain migration. I am troubled by people who are good Christian people who do not disagree with, but support and endorse the lies spread by this type of advertising. Our national policy of blanket deportations has been called immoral by Pope Francis. I strongly believe Christians are morally charged to respect God's Law over civil governments.
