#### "LISTEN TO OUR STORY"

(Our DACA Brothers and Sisters)

It was a joy with Fr. Ron and I to host in the RECTORY few months ago a warm and heartfelt hospitality to our DACA friends and family. DACA stands for the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals. It was an American immigration policy that allowed some individuals who entered the country as minors, and had either entered or remained in the country, to receive a renewable two-year period of deferred action from deportation and to be eligible for a work permit. As of 2017, approximately 800,000 individuals—referred to as Dreamers after the DREAM Act bill—were enrolled in the program created by DACA. The policy was established by the Obama administration in June 2012 and rescinded by the Trump administration in September 2017.

# THE PILGRIM'S CORNER (Continued from page 1)

It's our prayerful hope when the Executive Committee of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops issued a statement asking the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to extend DACA renewal deadlines especially at least in hurricane-impacted states. The statement also urges Congress to find a durable and permanent solution on behalf of DACA youth and urges the Administration to allow 75,000 refugee admissions into the United States in 2018.

One of my family friends who's daughter was a DACA recipient always tells me "Father, please lift the DACA and all of us in the margins up when you celebrate mass." When she told that to me, she was desperately in need to go to college and can be of support to her family. It was a moment of genuine accompaniment, dialogue and prayer of seeking God's mercy and compassion for those seeking refuge, and to advance the American value of freedom through providing safe harbor especially to those fleeing tyranny and religious persecution.

Pope Francis backed us up on this when he said that in this moment of moral decision, we need to avoid a common temptation nowadays: to discard whatever proves troublesome; the famous Golden Rule mentioned in the Gospel of Matthew, (Mt 7:12). The DACA young people are woven into the fabric of our country and of our Church, and are, by every social and human measure, American youth. We believe in the gifts and blessings of these exemplary young people who were brought here as children and who know only the United States as their home; most of them belong to the families, who are often driven to exile by war and extreme exploitation. While our country has the right and responsibility to regulate its border, I firmly believe in the possibility that it could be done humanly.

Despite the moments of tremendous anxiety and fear about their futures, these brave young people face deportation. Nevertheless, the CHURCH honors them with admiration as DACA youth live out their daily lives with hope and a determination to flourish and contribute to our American society: continuing to work and provide for their families, continuing to serve in the military, and continuing to receive an education.

On February 3, 2018 we would like to cordially invite you all in the PARISH HALL to listen to their story. Fr. Tom, Florek, SJ, Fr. Phil Cook, SJ, Bill O'Brien, our Deacons, Fr. Ron and I of the "Pastoral Migratoria" of the Archdiocese will be there to accompany and listen to the story of these young people and their families. Please come after the 4:30 pm Mass. We will be offering warm and cordial hospitality to everybody. God bless you, all!

# **DEACON BILL**

#### NOW, PUT YOUR FOOT ON THE BRAKE, AND PUT IT INTO DRIVE...

My memories of teaching my kids to drive are fresher in my mind than when I first took Driver's Training back in the early 1960's, but I (imagine) remember being guite nervous when it was my turn to get behind the wheel and actually drive a car in traffic. The actual driving time, in a real car, on real streets, with real traffic situations, did not come until the last two weeks of Driver's Ed. Prior to actually driving, we had days and days of driving "simulators" in class, reacting to filmstrips of driving situations. The simulators we used were not unlike the cars we drove, (except they had no radio!!!) and they could even simulate driving a stick shift. By the time we were allowed to actually drive, we were prepared, but we still needed guidance (even if we didn't realize it then). By the time we were finished with the formal "driver's Ed. Course, we were sufficiently competent to operate a motor vehicle safely on public streets and highways. And, the more we drove in differing situations, our competencies grew.

For Israel at the time of her Exodus, she was beginning a training period in becoming a nation. She would do so under the direct scrutiny of God, and his instructor Moses. Israel was leaving the classroom and venturing out onto the highways and byways of nationhood. She needed to learn how to be a nation in the real world. A nation in every context of the word. The Ten Plagues God wrought in Egypt were not simply for the benefit of Pharaoh. If Israel were to become a people of God in the sense of a voluntary relationship, they too needed to understand the impotence of Egypt's false gods versus the genuine power of God. Just as every student driver eventually needs to let go of the security blanket of the "classroom" to function in the real world; Israel needed to let go of the security blanket of false gods to become the People of God in the real world. In Israel's travels through the desert, she fought battles against kings and armies, hunger and thirst, snake bites and fear; plain unadulterated fear. Throughout their struggles, God was there to protect and guide them. For these early Israelites, rallying around God was "easier" he was "visible", at least in the form of a column of fire or smoke. Eventually God would become an idea, a theology. Eventually God would seem to absent himself (herself) from direct interaction with the People of God. From ancient times to our modern times, rallying against a visible enemy was and is different than trying to rally around an idea. Protestant Christians basically all use the "same" Bible; the King James version, or other shortened versions of Scripture. In the Protestant churches there are thousands and thousands of different sects, different ways of rallying around an idea. In the Catholic Church, we have our own array of opinions (ideas) about Scripture and faith. The real question we need to answer though: Who do we turn to for guidance, our opinions, or God?

FIVE SIMPLE WAYS TO LOWER YOUR COLD AND FLU RISK Earlier this fall, I've written articles reminding everyone to get a flu shot this season. You may or may not have decided to actually get the shot, but regardless of your personal decision, there are other strategies to use that will offer more protection against contracting the flu or other illnesses. Chances are you will be in a situation this cold and flu season where you come in contact with someone who is sick. The following are a few tips to help decrease your risk of contracting illnesses this winter:

1. Move away from the sneeze. When you are in a public place and someone sneezes or coughs around you, try breathing out slowly as you try to move away from them. This will keep you from inhaling virus-infected droplets as they are expelled. If you do get a respiratory virus, step away from other people when you sneeze or cough and completely cover your nose and mouth. Better yet, stay home if possible when you are ill to limit the spread of the virus. (That includes weekend mass!)

Hands Off! Respiratory infections can be transmitted through expelled droplets or by a contaminated surface. The easiest way to pick up germs is through our hands. Every surface harbors germs – computer keyboards, doorknobs, phones, banisters and even pens and shopping carts. Keep hands and fingers away from your face, mouth, eyes, nose, and wash your hands frequently, especially before eating.
 Keep Moving. During the winter, our natural inclination is to stay inside where it is warm and dry. Fight the urge to become a couch potato. But research indicates that regular exercise has some benefits in boosting immunity, resulting in fewer and less severe respiratory illnesses. Even if you are under the weather, as long as you don't have a fever, you can still work out. The general rule is that if your symptoms are simply coughing or sneezing, it is ok to work out. Fever or chills? Rest until you feel better.

4. Eat Better to Boost Immunity. Several vitamins and minerals help the immune system work properly, such as zinc, vitamin A, vitamin C and vitamin D. In addition to adequate vitamin intake, eating cooked mushrooms may boost your immune defense. Mushrooms may help to prevent respiratory infections by improving the production of protective immune substances in the mouth and other mucosal surfaces. Other foods that help boost immunity: berries, elderberry juice, onions and garlic, kale and other cruciferous vegetables.

5. Sleep well. Getting enough sleep is as important for your body as eating right, exercising, and practicing good hygiene. Lack of sleep not only makes it harder for you to get through the day, it is also linked to all kinds of health problems- from diabetes to increasing blood pressure to weight gain and increased risk for a heart attack. Inadequate sleep also makes it more likely that you will catch a cold. If you are tired and run down, you are more likely to be susceptible to infection. Get a good night's rest, maintain a regular schedule of bedtime and wake time. You will feel more rested and your body will be better able to perform optimally.




