WHEN I WAS YOUNG PART 2

I imagine that one of the most dramatic changes in today's society from that of my "sheltered" childhood is the diminished regard for legitimate authority. Now, do not misunderstand me, I am in no way advocating "blind obedience" to any system of legitimate authority. As reasoning adults, we are personally responsible to examine the "external validity "of what people insist is "true". Sometimes the "truth" lies only in the "spin" contrived by the speaker, sometimes the truth can be very "black or white". However, for most of us, the "truth" is only partially captured by our human perception. This responsibility is not to be confused with claiming a "right" to decide to believe what we want, obey the laws we like, do what we please. We live within the context of human society. We are thus bound by principle of protecting the common good, that which benefits the safety and security of the society. If someone decides that a specific law or practice is dramatically contrary to morality, and decides an action to counteract the "evil", that action needs to be carefully considered. The Pro-Life movement is a wonderful example; abortions are a horrible affront to humanity, yet "sanctioned" in law and practice. Abortions are such a monstrous evil that it demands a counter action. Right To Life groups around the U.S. and around the world involve themselves in a legitimate "civil disobedience" when they peacefully and publically confront the evil of abortions.

It is my opinion that the issue of "abortion" is one of the few black and white issues. I simply cannot conceive a situation where there is a legitimacy in the willful murder of an innocent life. [Note Bonum: When the pregnancy is a real threat to the life of the mother, that to allow a pregnancy to continue in the sure result of the death of the mother, can and must interrupted. The primary principle is the protecting the life of the mother. The death of the child is an undesired consequence. The distinction between this medical procedure and an abortion lies in the desire to save a life, not murder one.] There is though, another public policy becoming more prominent in our time and culture. The issue I refer to is the problem of immigration. If you are not fully descended from a Native American, you are a product of immigration. Many Catholics, Jews, Protestants, Muslims, and Atheists, are the here through a process of "chain migration". Immigrants from Eastern and Western Europe, Asia, Africa (discounting slavery) Latin America quite often arrive here as a "sponsored" immigrant by another family member or friend. I find it personally offensive to presume that every person entering the United States (legally or illegally) have violence in mind. I find it personally offensive to label a class of people as a "public threat" on the mere fact of the legality of their arriving in the United States.

When I was young, there was a form of accepted "disassociation"; Catholics and Protestants disregarded each other's religions; desegregation was still a "dream" for people of color; and Communists were evil personified. In our present time these animosities have faded (not disappeared). It seems though, we need to "hate" someone, and the immigrant is the "new" public recipient of hate and fear.



ST. ISIDORE HAS ADOPTED A STREAM

Popes John Paul II, Benedict and now Francis have all stressed the importance of taking better care of our planet. This earth that we live on is a gift from God, given to us to care for, to nurture and protect for future generations. The Christian Service Commission has decided, with Fr. Ron's concurrence, that this is a worthwhile project for our parish. We have adopted a part of the North Branch of the Clinton River at Pine Valley Golf course, south of 32 Mile Rd and Romeo Plank. How much of the river we'll be responsible for is yet to be determined. Twice a year, May and October, we will enter the river and collect aquatic insects. These insects tell the biologists how healthy the stream is or isn't.

Our Youth Minister, Matt Hunt, has committed the Youth Group to helping with this project. Obviously there will be some adult supervision needed; some of the members of our River Team need to be schooled in Basic Training and Bug ID. This will take place at the offices of the Clinton River Watershed Council on Saturday, April 21 at 8:30 am. The class is free but pre-registration is necessary. If you would like to join us in trying to help keep the Clinton River clean and also help protect our little corner of the planet, please call me at the office, 586-1700 and let's talk.

Go RED for Women

February isn't just for Valentine's Day; it is also Women's Heart Health month. The American Heart Association has developed the "Go RED for Women Campaign" to bring awareness and help combat the No. 1 killer in women. Yet only 1 in 5 American women believe that heart disease is their greatest health threat. Women are less likely to call 911 when they are experiencing symptoms of a heart attack because women's symptoms vary and are often not thought to be related to a heart attack.

Here are some more unsettling facts:

- Heart disease causes 1 in 3 women's deaths each year, killing approximately one woman every minute. While 1 in 31 American women dies from breast cancer each year.
- Ninety percent of women have one or more risk factors for developing heart disease.
- Since 1984, more women than men have died each year from heart disease and the gap between men and women's survival continues to widen.
- The symptoms of heart disease can be different in women vs. men, and are often misunderstood. The good news is there are lifestyle changes you can make to help lower your risk of heart disease:
 - Don't smoke
 - Manage your blood sugar
 - Lower your cholesterol
 - Know your family history
 - Stay active!
 - Lose weight
 - Eat healthy

D. B PERU - PERUVIAN AMAZON

Midwife Training and Mentor Support Program

Many women in remote villages of Peruvian Amazon deliver their babies at home. They rely on the skills of trained and experienced midwives for safe outcome. As older midwives move or pass away, the need for new ones to replace them becomes extremely important.

MAYAN FAMILIES - GUATEMALA

Well Mother Well Baby Program

Childhood malnutrition starts in the womb. The rate of chronic malnutrition in rural Guatemala is estimated at 53 percent. The Well Mother, Well Baby Program combats the high rate of eternal malnutrition and helps stop stunting before it starts.

AMERICAN FOR INTERNATIONAL AID AND ADOPTION

Amsa Rehabilitation Center - Home for Handicapped Kids - Korea

We would be supporting kids that will not be adopted because of their special needs. The kids receive physical therapy and need a new therapy table, desk and Language Therapy kit.

HEALING THE CHILDREN - MICHIGAN-OHIO CHAPTER

In the Stateside Program (bringing kids from aboard) we have helped more than 1,100 kids for 61 countries that spoke 29 different languages. The Medical/Surgical/Dental teams that traveled aboard service one 13,000 kids on 125 different Medical teams trips.

For every \$1.00 spent, \$20.00 worth of care was provided. St. Isidore will be helping Timothy to continue to get well and to go home to his family in Belarus.


