I AM FOREVER GRATEFUL

Few months before my vacation to the Philippines, I had a good chance to share my thoughts with Fr. Ron and Fr. Chris Talbot on how to live the spirit of "Unleashing the Gospel in our priestly life". It was a substantial dialogue about the Proposal for Pastoral Care and Priestly Community. In this proposal, we believe that it was a discernment guided by the Holy Spirit and has brought us to a point of recommending a model for priestly communal life and pastoral care for the three parishes that help facilitate the continuing implementation of the vision laid out in "Unleashing the Gospel." Yet, God is the God of surprises! Sometimes we propose, but oftentimes HE has another plan.

My three years of service as Parochial Vicar of Fr. Ron at Saint Isidore has always been a great blessing and an eye-opener in terms of understanding my ministry to our people. As time goes on, my ministry finds different expressions as the situation changes. There is no one unchangeable way of exercising my priestly ministry than my fruitful and joyful service at Saint Isidore. For this, I will be forever grateful to Fr. Ron, to the Staff, to the Leadership Team and to all the parishioners and friends who will always remain as my spiritual mentors for my next journey.

Certainly, I believe our God is a God of wonders. Every year when I celebrate my anniversary or my birthday I used to say: "Well, Lord, what surprises have you in store for me this time?" It is never the same as it was before. These surprises make my ministry life-giving and worthwhile. I must be open to the many challenges and opportunities for doing good, both great and small, which come my way.

The next venture of my ministry would be at Sacred Heart Parish in Imlay City and Saint Nicholas in Capac. Adopt-a-Stream!

If you read the bulletin two weeks ago, you saw that St. Isidore adopted a stream, that portion of the North Branch of the Clinton River south of 32 Mile Rd, west of Romeo Plank just off the Pine Valley Golf Course.

April 21, a Saturday, at the CRWC office on Auburn, we will be attending a class on identifying aquatic insects. This helps biologists determine the health of the stream by which insects are found and which are not found.

The following is blurb from the Clinton River Watershed Council: The Clinton River Watershed Council's Adopt-a-Stream program is a volunteer based program that empowers community members to protect local streams and rivers by monitoring their health. Volunteers are trained, teamed up, assigned stream sites, given equipment, data sheets and a collection protocol, and then sent out to gather information on streamside habitats, physical characteristics and benthic macroinvertebrate populations. Twice a year -May and October - teams of trained volunteers visit their adoption site and collect data. After the initial 3 hour training session each volunteer dedicates approximately 3-4 hours of their time per year...

As you can see, the commitment to this worthy endeavor is not a lot of time and is a tremendous help in cleaning up our waterways, providing recreational opportunities for all of us.

If you are interested in helping, please call the office, and if I'm not available, leave your name and number and I will get back to you. I anticipate registering volunteers within two to three weeks.

BY WHOSE AUTHORITY...

It is very easy, I believe, to read or listen the Gospels and come away with the idea that Jesus had no respect for the religious leaders of Israel. Jesus seems most often to call them hypocrites because of their strict adherence to the "LAW" and with no regard for the SPIRIT of the law. But, Jesus never questioned the authority of the leadership to decide on matters of religious practices. Jesus didn't question their authority, he challenged their application. The Pharisees on the other hand frequently asked Jesus: "By whose authority...?" Jesus, never denies the legitimacy of their question. Even today, a man showing up for Mass wearing clerical dress is not automatically invited to participate at the altar. If the man is not known to the pastor as being a deacon or priest in good standing in the diocese, he is obligated to deny participation at the altar. If any priest or deacon goes outside the diocese to preside at any liturgical sacrament (Baptism, Marriage, or Mass) that priest or deacon must present a letter from their diocesan bishop indicating their status to validly preside at the sacrament.

Then, what is Jesus' authority? There is nothing mentioned in any Gospel explaining where he received his education. We know of no rabbi that was Jesus' instructor. Jesus never proffered any traditional evidence of "his authority" (no diploma from any ancient divinity school). So, why should we believe him? In the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) have God saying: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." (Mtt 3:18; Mk 1:11; Lk 3:22). John introduces Jesus' authority through his personal experience of seeing the Spirit of God, descend upon Jesus (Jn 1:33). In John's Gospel, Jesus is more closely identified in His divine nature than in the other Gospels. Matthew, Mark and Luke present Jesus as the fulfillment of all prophecies in the person of Jesus, the immediacy of God's Kingdom, and the inclusive nature of God's forgiving nature. Jesus is mandated by God to accomplish these promises. John goes further to stress that Jesus is more than a person operating under a mandate from God, Jesus is the Word of God made flesh (Jn 1:14).

Why, we may ask, was Jesus' authority such an issue with the Sadducees and Pharisees? Because Jesus challenged the ways the "laws" were being enforced. Jesus challenged the traditional attitudes of arrogance by the wealthy and the intolerance toward the poor. Jesus challenged the value of "exclusiveness" instilled in Palestinian society. Jesus challenged the participation of the Pharisees in fostering and defending this attitude of exclusivity through oppressive regulations, only allowing exemptions for them alone. Jesus challenged the obsessive insistence on miniscule tenants within a "law" at the expense of people. And true to human nature, the Pharisees rejected Jesus' criticisms on the principle of "unsupported authority".

Today, the question can be turned back on us. We call ourselves Christian. We may go to a Catholic Church, a Lutheran, Methodist, Baptist, or whatever, but we call ourselves "Christian". We profess to be followers of Jesus, the Son of God and the Second Person of the Trinity. By whose authority then, do we claim the right to determine who is or is not worthy of life, human dignity, safety, or freedom?

COLORECTAL CANCER: SHOULD YOU BE CONCERNED?

If you are 50 or older, you need to think about colorectal cancer. Most colon or rectal cancers occur in men and women who are 50 and

"But no one in our family has had colorectal cancer!"

Most people who get colorectal cancer have no family history of the disease. In addition, you can have colorectal cancer and not even know it. If you have a parent, brother, sister, or child who has had colon or rectal cancer, then testing is even more important for you. In fact, you may need to start testing before you are age 50.

Get tested. You have the power to help stop colorectal cancer before it starts. Colorectal cancer begins with a growth, called a polyp that is not yet cancer. Testing can help your healthcare provider tell whether there is a problem, and some tests can find polyps before they become cancer. Most people who have polyps removed never get colorectal cancer. If colorectal cancer is found, you have a good chance of beating it with treatment if it is found early (when it is small and has not spread). Moreover, testing can help find it early.

We believe that preventing colorectal cancer, not just finding it early, should be a major reason for being tested. The Parish Health Ministry will be providing FREE Faith Fit colorectal screening kits at our next Blood Pressure Screening in the Front Conference Room the weekend of March 17th and 18th. Supplies are limited, so stop in and see one of the Parish Nurses to take advantage of the American Cancer Society's Community outreach in colorectal cancer prevention in the privacy of your own home, for FREE!

MASSAGE THERAPISTS NEEDED!



Many women in rumor villages of the Peruvian Amazon deliver their babies at home. The rely on the skills of trained and experienced midwives for a safe outcome. As older midwives move or pass away, the need for new ones to replace them becomes extremely important. D.B. Peru offers training to both new and experienced midwives and provides the medical supplies they need for a safe delivery. D.B. Peru volunteers encourage experienced midwives to mentor new ones. While more women are delivering their babies in clinics, the need for midwives — especially in the most remote villages — is vital to the wellbeing of the community's new mothers and infants. Classes include mastering skills for critical situations, like infant resuscitation. A baby doll model helps students practice and gain confidence.
