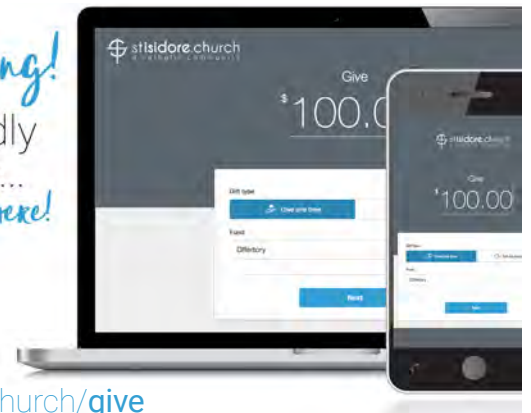

CHECKING SOURCES

Back in 1981, a “lifetime ago”, I was at Wayne State University, in the College of Education. In one of my teaching theories classes we were all asked to explain why we had chosen our “teaching major”. [My teaching major was Industrial Vocation – Electrical] There was, in the class a young lady who had chosen Journalism as her teaching major because it was her opinion that “Journalism” was “pure” and “unbiased”. I don’t remember that her opinion was shared by much of the class, and especially the teacher. He was quick to challenge her idea that any “news” story was protected from some biased opinion. Without examining every person on earth, I am of the opinion that every person experiences life through a set of “filters” that qualify how any event will be perceived. These filters will be psychological, environmental and socially developed. Thus a “reporter” reporting on any event, reports on those things that impact the sensitivities of the reporter. Once the reporter finishes “their story” and presents it to an editor (either through some print, audible or visual media) further “revisions are introduced” into the story to fit the time and space constraints of the media, and reflect the biases of the editors. Having a personal bias is not something to avoid, it is impossible.

In another “teaching theory class” we discussed at length the moral imperative that we understand our own personal biases and how these biases will affect our teaching. It doesn’t make a difference if one is teaching mathematics, language arts, science, or history; curriculums are developed through a “fundamental” bias and transmitted to future generations through another “bias filter”, that of the instructor, to be received by the student through their own personal biases. A decision to teach this and not that is a bias. A decision was made that “this” is more important than “that”. That is a bias. These biases may be quite well suited and justified, but their “validity” will have a greater justification than “what I think – believe – feel”. It is my opinion, my personal bias, that values of integrity, honesty, work, and healthy competition should be promoted in education and society. It is my opinion, my personal bias, that human life is a precious gift to be protected and nurtured from conception until natural death. It is my opinion, my personal bias that “human rights” are not functions to any condition of birth or nationality, but equal to all human persons.

I believe (am biased toward) the idea that biases are not to be avoided, but recognized and challenged. My opinions and biases have changed over the years, modified with experience and reflection. And, here is the challenge; if we only consult those who share the same opinions and shared biases, it is nearly impossible to honestly investigate the validity of any opinion. If we never bother to verify, check the sources, of statements that reflect and support a personal bias, we are exposed to promoting some very dangerous lies. I imagine that because it is difficult for me to challenge ideas, “facts” or comments that support my own beliefs and biases, that it is equally difficult for others. Yet, in all honesty, we are called to “check all our sources.”



Elder abuse is not a pleasant topic to discuss, but we are all charged to keep the most vulnerable of our population safe. Research suggests that 1 in 10 Americans 60 and over have experienced some form of elder abuse. But even as prosecutors around the country target elder abuse, many cases go unreported. Some older adults fear that if they complain, they will end up in a nursing home. Those with dementia may not be able to remember that they have been abused. Studies show that more than a third of people with dementia suffer psychological or physical abuse at the hands of people providing care. Meanwhile, their natural advocates and watchdogs – family members – often live hundreds or thousands of miles away. Elder abuse is an intentional act, or failure to act, by a caregiver or another person in a relationship involving an expectation of trust that cause or creates a risk of harm to an older adult. (An older adult is defined as someone age 60 or older.) Abuse can take different forms, which include:

PHYSICAL ABUSE:

The intentional use of physical force that results in acute or chronic illness, bodily injury, physical pain, functional impairment, distress or death.

SEXUAL ABUSE OR ABUSIVE SEXUAL CONTACT:

Forced or unwanted sexual interaction (touching and non-touching acts) of any kind with an older adult.

EMOTIONAL OR PSYCHOLOGICAL ABUSE:

Verbal or nonverbal behavior that results in the infliction of anguish, mental fear or distress.

NEGLECT:

Failure by a caregiver or other responsible person to protect an elder from harm, or the failure to meet the needs for essential medical care, nutrition, hydration, hygiene, clothing, basic activities of daily living or shelter, which results in a serious risk of compromised health and safety.

FINANCIAL ABUSE OR EXPLOITATION:

The illegal, unauthorized, or improper use of an older individual's resources by a caregiver or other person in a trusting relationship, for the benefit of someone other than the older individual.

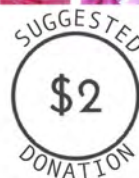

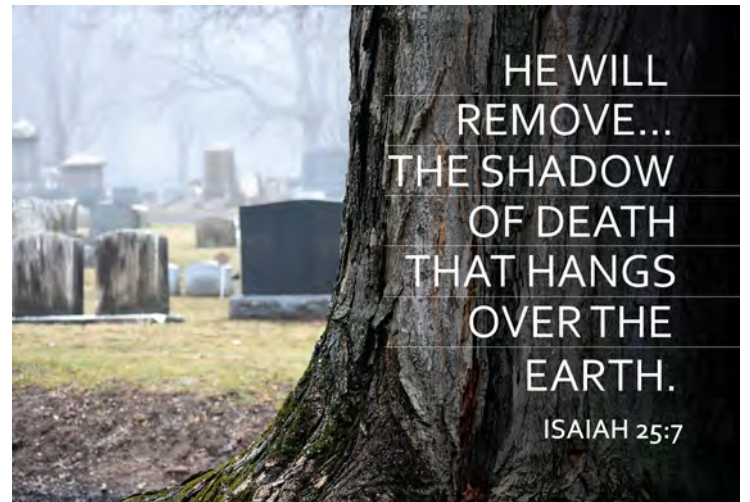

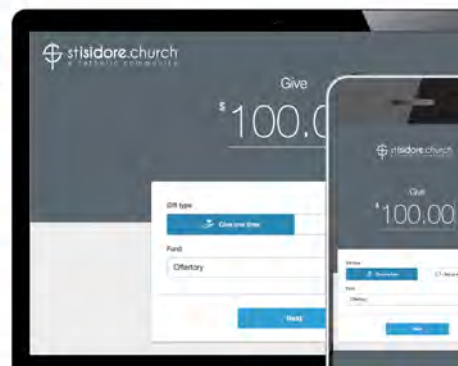
