WE JUST NEED TO

This morning Joyce was reading to me from a book "Fast Food Genocide", by Joel Fuhrman, M.D. In some instances, there was nothing new to me about how unhealthy "fast food" is, and how it has been a major factor in America becoming one of the "fattest" nations on earth. What was new to me, and honestly quite frightening was the fourth chapter in the book where Dr. Fuhrman described the history of PELLAGRA in America and around the world. For centuries, pellagra was misdiagnosed as some form of bacteria infection or genetic condition. Eventually, when pellagra was correctly identified as being caused by a diet deficiency of NIACIN, a B vitamin, the findings were largely discounted and neglected because it challenged the diagnosis of "established medical theory" and (I think that this is the most critical point) the idea that people are genetically inferior or superior to others. If the cause of pellagra, a vitamin deficiency that could be prevented by introducing more dark green vegetables into the diet, hadn't flown in the face of "vested interests" perhaps the violence and mayhem resulting from the effects of pellagra could have been avoided.

I am not trying to suggest that the "vested interest" here was the Fast Food industry, in the late 1800's and early 1900's, there was no "Fast Food Industry". The "vested interest" was primarily the concept that people were genetically predisposed to violent and antisocial behaviors, mental deficiencies or disease, and the only "real cure" for society's problem was "forced sterilization". The proposal that by simply introducing a B vitamin, Niacin, into a diet could reduce the prison population and those in asylums threatened those industries that thrived on violence and mental disorders. The idea that people were not "genetically pre-disposed" threatened the validity of mandatory sterilization: "perfect societies"; or "master races". The science of genetics is a real and valid science. However, there is a danger, as in every science, to allow one to become so deeply involved with their conclusion, that it becomes their religion. True science, as I have been informed by our son, never claims to have the "final answer" but a reasonable (for now) solution.

A genuine concern is that some believe that people are "naturally" superior to others, and others naturally "inferior". I do not argue against the validity of people having different talents, abilities, and capacities for learning. I vigorously reject though, the suggestion that any person is inferior to another. I am frightened by the popularity of the idea that any society can be made "better" by merely ridding itself of "undesirables". Adolf Hitler tried it with disastrous human consequences. I am frightened by this same ideology becoming popular in America, among people in all Christian faiths. God has never called people to live in "perfect" societies, but to love one another perfectly.

Even in our obsessive technology driven society, we seem to choose to ignore a universal reality of humanity, that in God's heart there is an absolute equality of love. In God's image that is shared by all humanity, there is only one solution - Love one another as I have loved you.
