

Let's keep him in our prayers as he assumes his new ministry. I told him to "just keep smiling" and the people will "love your joyful spirit", as we did here.



WELCOME, FR. MARK!

I am Fr. Mark George SJ, a Jesuit (Society of Jesus). I am 60 years old, and am a member of the Jesuit community at UDMercy in Detroit, and will continue to spend two days a week (midweek) with my community there, while living and working at St. Isidore most of the week, especially weekends of course.

I was born in 1957 in Mishawaka IN, next door to South Bend, and am a graduate of Notre Dame in South Bend. I have been a Jesuit for 30 years, and a priest for 20 years. I have done mostly



parish work in Michigan and Ohio, including many jobs in the Detroit Metro Area. Before joining the Jesuits, I taught math and art at Holy Redeemer HS in SW Detroit in the mid-80's. As a Jesuit priest, I have done three year stints at Our Lady of LaSalette in Berkley and Ss. Peter & Paul in downtown Detroit. Very recently, I have done part time work at three places: St. Paul of Tarsus in Clinton Twnshp, St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac, and St. Mary's in Monroe. In 2015-2016, I did various ministries with the Jesuits in Beirut, Lebanon. Because my father's parents were from Lebanon, I am a bi-ritual priest, Roman and Maronite, one of the Eastern Catholic Churches that is well represented here in SE Michigan. (My late mother was of German and Irish ancestry.)

I am an artist. I used to do large oil paintings, in an expressionistic style, with bold colors, focusing on the Passion of Christ. Some of these paintings I am quite proud of. Now, however, I am very excited about a very different artistic direction, which combines my passions for art and geometry. I am doing 3-D designs on spherical surfaces (soccer balls!), and some other designs, such as ornaments, logos, even baseball uniforms—fun and fascinating stuff for me. Because this is something new for me, I have not yet learned how to make finished products for these new designs.

I am also into sports. I played football and baseball in my younger days, and have done some coaching, but now I especially enjoy analyzing strategy and rules—as well as appreciating the power and artistry of today's athletes.

What first attracted me to the Jesuits was the order's focus, ever since Vatican Council II in the early 60's, on "a faith that does justice." Even before joining the Jesuits, I was very involved in Bread for the World, the Christians citizens' lobby that educates the public and advocates for poor and hungry people here and around the world. I am very excited about our current pope, Pope Francis, not just because he is a fellow Jesuit, but because he embodies what we Jesuits profess to stand for. In a time of great crisis in the Church and the world, he is able to read the "signs of the times," as Vatican II called for, being honest and realistic about the problems we face. He goes to where people are suffering the most, such as refugee camps, and offers us hope. He speaks about "the joy of the Gospel" and his face shows it! But equally important, he is able to admit when he makes a mistake, and correct his own errors, something that previous popes and current world leaders have not been good at.

I am thrilled to be assigned by the Archdiocese, and by my Jesuit superiors, to St. Isidore. I am eager to work with Fr. Ron and the entire staff. I was able to join the staff for a daylong retreat a couple weeks ago, as well as spend a couple hours at the Strawberry Festival. I am excited about getting to know you all. God bless you! (And pray for me as I begin this new ministry!)

PHYSICAL ACTIVITY AND AGING

Exercising over a lifetime is the best medicine to slow the aging process and to stay healthy. You should get at least 30 minutes of exercise a day but most of us never find that half-hour block.

The good news is that people who sprinkle activity throughout their day may get the same health benefits as people who exercise in longer, more structured bouts.

Here are some clever tips to sneak exercise into your daily routine:

- 1. While waiting in line: Squeeze your behind 10 times. Tighten your stomach muscles 10 times. Stretch your arms downward behind you and squeeze your triceps 10 times. Rise on your toes and squeeze your calves 10 times.
- 2. When sitting at your desk at work or watching TV at home: Stand up and walk around frequently for a total of 20 to 30 minutes. (Sitting is the new smoking, and hazardous to your health!)
- 3. While making dinner and waiting for water to boil: Do arm circles. With arms out to the side, do 15 circles in a clockwise direction, then 15 counterclockwise.
- 4. While brushing your teeth: Stand on one foot for 60 seconds and then switch while or try balancing while lifting your leg to the side. (Balance decreases with age, but can be regained.)
- While waiting for your beverages to brew: Loosen your calves and ankles by standing arm's length from the wall and placing one foot behind the other, heels down, knees straight. Lean towards wall bracing with arms. Bend forward leg to stretch calf of back leg. Hold for 30 seconds. Switch.

WHICH WAY TO TURN?

The question of "legal vs illegal" is a very important question and not one to be laughed away. However, I believe that the more important question is not the "legality" of a situation, but the morality of the "law". If we allow ourselves to not question the morality of a law, but to insist upon its enforcement, because it's the law, then we allow grave evils to continue. If we are to accept that "the law of the land" (of human origin) is superior to Natural Law and Divine Law, then The Nuremberg Trials were a farce, and Oscar Schindler was no hero, but just another criminal. If those seeking and providing abortions are "within" the written law of the land, then who are we to criticize? It seems that just about the only thing "pro-immigration" and "anti-immigration" forces agree on, is that our "Immigration System" is broken; seriously broken. Yet, rather than work toward a bi-partisan rewrite of our immigration law, we are supposed to continue with a broken system regardless of its offense to Moral and Natural law?

As I understand it, the question breaks down to a choice between the "Rights of Humans" versus the "Rights of nations". Our faith reminds us that humans are created by God, and nations are created by humans. Pope Francis, as did his predecessors St. John Paul II, Pope Paul VI, reminds us that as members of the Body of Christ, our first allegiance is to Christ. We are told that our hearts need to be directed to God's way rather than the way of humans because we are creations in the image and likeness of God.

Consider the following:

"Thus says the Lord: 'For three transgressions of Edom and for four, I will not revoke the punishment; because he pursued his brother with the sword, and cast off all pity, and his anger tore perpetually, and he kept his wrath forever." Amos 1:11

Who were the Edomite's? They were the descendants of Esau, the older brother of Jacob (Israel). How did they pursue their brother with the sword and cast off all pity? When the Israelites fled the invading Assyrians and Babylonians, Edom captured those who fled to Edom for safety, and returned them to the invading armies to be killed, man woman and child. What do you think God would have His prophets tell us, when we turn our hearts away from our "brothers" and show no pity to them?

Ask yourself:

Why would anyone leave their country of origin? In America, we tend to be a more fluid society. Many people move from house to house, city to city, state to state for many different reasons. But not very many people leave the United States. What drives people to flee, not simply leave, their homes, their countries? What are you willing to do, to give up, just to protect your family? What are you willing to do, to give up, and to help others just trying to protect their families?
