FR. MARK'S MUSINGS

If you were at one of the Masses I preached July 28-29, this reflection will be familiar, but Fr. Ron asked me to use this as my "musing" for this week.

In Arlington National Cemetery, there are row after row of neatly arranged white crosses, with an occasional Star of David here or there, many of them men and women who served in the armed forces, many of whom died in the line of duty.

Along roadsides, it is not uncommon to see a white cross indicating that someone was killed there in a traffic accident.

Of course, we see crosses and little shrines where mass shootings have occurred.

At Jesuit institutions, it is not uncommon to see white crosses on a lawn at times, commemorating several Jesuits who were martyred in El Salvador, along with thousands of ordinary Salvadorans, in a brutal campaign that lasted through the entire decade of the

1980's, perhaps longer. We Jesuits want to draw attention to this, because the soldiers who carried out these atrocities were trained at our own School of the Americas, as it was called, at Fort Benning, Georgia.

And here on our front lawn we now have crosses to remember the 2,000 plus fetuses and unborn babies who die every day from abortions.

All of these examples represent tragedies. All of us must die of course, but none of us wants to die a violent death, a premature death, an unnecessary or unjust death. We believe in a God of life, a God who created all life here on Earth—even on Mars, if we find there was or is life in that lake they've just discovered under the ice there! We believe in Jesus the Christ, who has overcome death and given us eternal life.

It is not God's will that anyone die in a war—it is not God's will that there even are wars. It's not God's will that anyone die at the hands of an oppressive government anywhere in the world. Not God's will that any refugee dies of thirst in the desert of southern Arizona or drown in the Mediterranean Sea, trying to escape violence or extreme poverty in their home country.

It is not God's will that anyone die in a mass shooting at a school, or on our inner-city streets. Not God's will that anyone die in a traffic accident, especially if it was caused by a drunk driver.

Not God's will that anyone die from starvation, lack of safe drinking water, preventable diseases—especially a child. Not God's will that anyone die of natural disasters, especially when those disasters are exacerbated by human activity like global warming or deforestation.

It is not God's will that an unborn child should die of abortion or even a miscarriage. It is not God's will that any mother should die during an abortion, or even in childbirth. It is not God's will that infants die from lack of good prenatal care or postnatal care.

I listed all these tragedies because sometimes people think that we Catholics only care about unborn children—once they're born, they're on their own. Of course, this is not true, but you could almost get that idea from the way some Catholics talk, and quite frankly, the way some of us vote. Even bishops, who should have a broader perspective, sometimes suffer from this sort of tunnel vision.

So, when we Catholics do bring up the issue of abortion, we have to be careful how we frame the issue. First of all, we do not want to shame any woman who has had an abortion, or even any man who has paid for one. We believe abortion is wrong, but Jesus always forgave sinners. He reached out especially to people who have made mistakes due to difficult circumstances or societal pressures, and especially to women, who of course are the ones who have to deal with inconvenient pregnancies and who are more often the victims of social stigma.

The last thing we would want to do is make someone feel unwelcome here because of a regrettable mistake they made earlier in their life. On the contrary, we at St. Isidore should welcome those who suffer from the guilt of an abortion. Even more, the church should reach out to those who are at risk of abortion, such as teenage or unwed mothers, and the poor. We try to give them the information they need so that they have other options, like adoption. Not just to talk them out of abortion, but to give them real assistance and hope. To make sure that they have the prenatal and postnatal care they need. This involves our time and our material assistance—this also involves political decisions that help at-risk pregnant women, more than just outlawing abortion.

A BATTLE IS LOST, BUT THE WAR IS NOT OVER

Some short facts of history: In the war of 1812, the Americans did not "win" a single land battle (the Battle of New Orleans was fought six days after the signing of the Treaty of Paris which officially ended the war between the United States and Great Brittain).

In the Civil war between the North and South, the Confederate Army won more battles than the Union Army.

For centuries, America enjoyed a "sense" of security in her isolation from the world by two oceans. Attacking and sustaining a successful military campaign against America was not seen as a realistic possibility prior to the age of intercontinental ballistic missiles. Some may remember the movie October Sky – a movie about a small group of West Virginia high school boys who are fascinated by rockets and actually develop a prototype engine that would advance the American Space Program. Some of us (my age and older) might remember the genuine panic in America when Russia first successfully launched a satellite – Sputnik I into orbit, visible by the naked eye crossing over America on a clear night. America was no longer protected by the expanse of an ocean on either side. We had become vulnerable.

For a decade after that eventful launch in October, 1957, the United States had dedicated billions of dollars and manhours toward establishing a system of "security" to militarily protect America from foreign attack. In 1969 Russia had developed a limited Antiballistic Missile defense system and the nuclear race was heated up exponentially. In 1973 U.S. President Richard Nixon and Russian President Leonid Brezhnev worked out a limited Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT 1) and in 1979, President Jimmy Carter and President Brezhnev signed a second and more restrictive agreement SALT 2. But there was still a tremendous fear and tension over the possibility of an eventual nuclear war. The SALT 2 treaty expired in 1985 and was not renewed, increasing the panic of an even more aggressive nuclear build-up. In 1987, President Ronald Reagan and Soviet General Secretary, Mikhail Gorbachey signed a unilateral treaty to eliminate intermediate and short range nuclear missiles. Since the United States and Russia were the only two countries with nuclear weapons, this treaty brought a great relief to a panic-stricken world. Many countries today though, are now "nuclear capable;" capable of initiating a nuclear strike against another nation. Our sense of "security" was no longer supported by isolations of oceans or agreements to de-nuclearize our military.

If you are old enough you probably will forever remember the exact circumstances of your day when you heard that Japan had bombed Pearl Harbor. I remember exactly the circumstances, of where I was, what I was doing, when I heard that the World Trade Center was "bombed" by flying a plane into it, and then the second Tower, and then the Pentagon, etc. Since September 11, 2001, America has lived in terror of another "attack." 911 may be an "emergency" call, but 9/11 is a panic call. If we are to allow our fears to direct our every action as a country; that we no longer put our faith in God, in His fidelity and His promise of protection, then on September 11, 2001, the terrorists won the war! They destroyed America!


A program to Help Couples Heal and Renew their Marriages.

MISSION APPEAL

Next weekend, we welcome Fr. Jose Manjakunnel from India. The mission diocese of Imphal in Northeast India is home to 35 tribes of Mongolian origin. The first Catholic baptism in the diocese was recorded in 1952. The Catholic population has grown up to 100,000 now. The diocese has 45 parishes, and 5 Mission Centers, 160 priests including 82 indigenous tribal priests. The growth of the Church has always been accompanied by various challenges and persecutions during the past decades. Between 1990 - 2001, six of our young and dynamic missionaries were killed for witnessing the Gospel.

Besides direct evangelization, the Church is actively involved in the everyday life of the people through other forms of apostolate like education, health care, self-help program, rehabilitation of the sick, drug addicts and the orphans. Much remains to be done for this interior and underdeveloped region through your participation and generous support.

In spite of the many challenges, missionary efforts are yielding an increase in vocation to priesthood and Religious life. The proceeds of the 2018 Mission appeal will be used for training 25 Touring Catechists for the parishes. Your generous support and prayers will be of great help for the evangelization work in the diocese of Imphal that began 70 years ago.


CROSS DISPLAY




