

TRUST is a Five Letter Word

In an age of con artists and internet scams that have stolen trillions of dollars, threatened billions of lives, "trust" has become sort of a four letter-word. In some way or another, every system of authority, be it political, religious or commercial has proven itself "untrustworthy." Agreements, national and international, economic and commercial, even personal, are broken frequently, fueling the need for lawyers to explain why it isn't really a break in trust, or it is a necessary change. (I apologize to all the lawyers out there, but there is a reality here.) A recent article in the August issue of AARP (a magazine of the American Association of Retired Persons) explained that the greatest percentage of trust abusers – defrauders – are friends and family members of the victims. When a politician, a sales person, a friend, say: "Trust me!" Fear often precedes confidence. So, what's new?

In the Garden, God told Adam and Eve to trust Him alone: we know that story. God, through Noah told the people to trust Him alone; we know that story too. It took decades of wandering before Abraham would finally trust God and even Moses would forever struggle with the fickleness of the people of God, Israel. Throughout the Scriptures, Hebrew and Christian alike, we read of the struggles to actually live out a life trusting in God. Throughout the Scriptures, not trusting in God brought calamity. The prophets from Amos to Jeremiah spoke of repenting and turning in trust to God for deliverance from the enemy. When Israel (or Judah) obeyed and trusted, their safety was secured; when they tried to rely solely on their own initiatives, they were destroyed. Around 900 BCE. Isaiah warned king Ahaz NOT to attempt an allegiance with Egypt against Assyria. Ahaz ignored the warning and Assyria eventually destroyed the Egyptian army and occupied Israel. Isaiah (the "Second Isaiah") warned Judah to trust in God's protection from the Assyrian army which was building siege works against the walls of Jerusalem. Judah trusted, and the Assyrian army did not destroy the city of Jerusalem.

From the time of the beginning of humanity until the time of Jesus, "trust in God" was confined to a concept of "temporal existence." The concept of an eternal life, even eternal life with God was beyond the imagination of Israel, let alone the rest of the world. Just retribution must, in the imagination of the people, come within the "lifetime" of the victim to have significance. The Book of Job is a case study of when "justice" doesn't follow the "imagined" path. I am one of those who believe that the most difficult concept Jesus needed to teach the world is to trust in God's image of justice, not strictly the human image of "eye for an eye..." (c.f. Mtt 5-7). I am also one of those who believe that at the very core of God's "justice" is mercy. For so many people throughout human history, getting even (justice) wasn't enough, it was about getting ahead.

One of the early "critiques" of the fledgling "Christian" community was noted by one of the Church Fathers, Tertullian: "You will know they are Christians by how they love one another." If we portray a nation filled with hatred, selfishness, and deceit, how can anyone know we are Christian? If we don't trust God's mercy, how can we ever expect others to trust ours?







These items are suggestions. When shopping think about what you would like to get if you could not go to the store for a year.

Personal Hygiene/Medical:

Combs, brushes, Q-Tips, ChapStick, eye drops, stick deodorant, body lotion, individual Kleenex packs, razors, toothpaste, toothbrushes, mouth wash, body wash and bar soap, manicure sets, baby wipes, Cortaid and Benadryl creams, Bio Freeze, foot care products (medicated or not), Travel size toiletries, lotion, shampoos and conditioners for all types of ethnicity, tampons, menstrual pads, hair clips and ponytail bands. **Tubes of shaving cream (NO Aerosol, nail polish or perfume) 'NO bath towels.'**

Breakfast Foods:

Pop Tarts, Granola Bars, pre-sweetened cereal, cereal bars, oatmeal (in packets), powdered dry milk and sugar.

Beverages:

Hot chocolate, Crystal light, Kool-Aid, coffee, instant coffee, flavored dry coffee creamer, tea, Tang drink. Any small powdered packets of water flavor.

Sacred Heart Major Seminary/Institute for Ministry




