FR. MARK'S MUSINGS

Last Sunday, Pope Francis canonized two saints, a pope and an archbishop who died within a couple of years of each other—Pope Paul VI in 1978, and Archbishop Oscar Romero in 1980. Both of these churchmen had a strong influence on Jorge Bergoglio (Pope Francis.)

Both men knew that Christian faith in these modern times must entail a great love for, and personal involvement with, the poor. They were advocates for peace and justice. Paul VI's philosophy is encapsulated in a simple phrase that has very profound implications: "If you want peace, work for justice." Romero became a martyr for the cause of peace and justice.

Paul VI was pope when Bergoglio was first ordained priest in 1969, a time of great change in the Church in the wake of Vatican Council II. Changes that were embraced by Bergoglio's religious order, the Jesuits.

Meanwhile, Romero was Archbishop of San Salvador city (El Salvador country) at the same time that Bergoglio was the Jesuit provincial superior of another Latin American country, Argentina.

FR. MARK'S MUSINGS



There was great turmoil in both El Salvador and Argentina at that time, the 1970's and 80's. Both countries were ruled by repressive right-wing military governments. (Sad to say, both governments had strong ties to the US.) These governments were responsible for an estimated 30,000 deaths each. Romero himself, along with 7 Jesuits and 4 American (US) churchwomen were among those killed.

Romero's faith journey was a fascinating one. At the time he was appointed archbishop in 1977, he was considered a quiet, bookish, conservative bishop who was unlikely to get very involved in the conflict going on in his country. However, just one month after he took office, his very close Jesuit friend Fr. Rutilio Grande was killed by the ruling junta. Grande's death greatly impacted Romero. He saw that he could no longer be neutral, that he had to stand up for human rights. He became a passionate advocate for the poor, and critic of the military government.

In one famous radio address to the entire nation, Romero spoke directly to the soldiers in his country. He said, "Brothers, you came from your own people. You are killing your own brothers... the law of God says, 'Thou shalt not kill'...I beg you, I order you: stop the repression."

Romero knew that his impassioned stand made him a target. Like Gandhi and Dr. King, he saw his death coming. He said, "I do not believe in death without resurrection. If they kill me, I will rise again in the people of El Salvador." Romero was assassinated while celebrating mass with nuns in a small hospital chapel.

At the canonization last Sunday, Romero had relics of both saints. He carried Paul VI's bishop staff and used his chalice. He also wore Romero's blood-stained belt.

CONNECTING POINT

Who do I look up to for their humility and how can I learn from them?

Who do I look up to for their humility, and how can I learn from them? Like most people, I look especially to people in my own profession. The priests, parish priests in particular, who have best exemplified this virtue for me, interestingly, have mostly been German-Americans: my boyhood associate pastor Edmund Miller, my Jesuit mentor Jim Hasse, and a longtime close friend of myself and my family, Jim Von Tobel. (All deceased.) Plus, one very much living Belgian, Fr. Victor— I'm not just saying that because he's my current boss, and I'm sure all of you would agree with my assessment here.

There are some priests, including some Jesuits, who act as if their priesthood gives them some sort of exalted status. Obviously, these are not the sort of priests I'm talking about here. The priests I am describing are priests who are not ashamed to coach a school basketball team, teach a religious ed class, put together a Christmas Pageant or Passion Play, cook for large groups of people, do some gardening around the church or cleaning in the rectory, straighten things up inside the church, even do a little snow shoveling or lawn mowing as needed. Or, in inner city or inner ring suburban neighborhoods, just hang out on the porch talking with people in the neighborhood, making the rectory a place where folks feel free to just drop in.

Sometimes in my various assignments, in parishes that are further from the city and more affluent, when I have tried to emulate these priests in various ways, I have almost been interrogated about it. "What are you doing shoveling snow, Father? That's not your job." Things like that. But while almost every parish has a maintenance and facilities staff, there are always some things that happen after hours, tasks that fall through the cracks, or things we would rather not bother the maintenance staff with. And there are things like cooking that pertain to hospitality.

A priest should never feel that he is above doing things that any ordinary homeowner might do, and never shy away from the ministry of hospitality. He should be willing to do almost anything that furthers the ministry of the parish and the building of the kingdom. This for me is one of the hallmarks of humility for those of us in priestly parish ministry.

PARISH HEALTH MINISTRY

In partnership with St. John Providence Health System

Yearly, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) hosts two National Drug Take Back Events in partnership with community organizations and local law enforcement. This fall's Drug Take Back Day is Saturday, October 27 and it serves as an important reminder and call to action for all of us to clean out our home medicine cabinets. In response to the opioid epidemic, Operation Rx is Macomb's county-wide collaborative effort aimed at preventing prescription drug and opioid misuse, abuse, and addiction. Its mission is to save lives by empowering individuals and our community to prevent and eradicate prescription drug and opioid misuse and abuse in Macomb County. Why should you practice proper medication disposal? Here are 5 Reasons:

1. Properly disposing unused or expired prescription medications can prevent public safety issues like accidental poisoning, overdose, and abuse
2. Unused prescription medication thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or sold illegally
3. Flushing medication down the toilet can contaminate the water supply
4. Disposing unused prescription medications properly through a take back site protects the environment
5. Two-thirds of teens who misused pain relievers in the past year say they got them from family and friends, including their home's medicine cabinet

RIGHT TO LIFE MACOMB

Compassion Pregnancy Center held its 23rd Annual Fundraising Banquet earlier this year with the theme Grace Wins. Hebrews 4:16—"Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need."

A brave former client of the center gave her testimony of how God worked in her life to steer her away from a scheduled abortion. She was not a typical abortion seeker—she was married with two children already but she had recently lost her job and her marriage was in crisis. Neither she nor her husband wanted this baby. The client had examinations at two abortion facilities, without ending her pregnancy, prior to visiting Compassion Pregnancy Center. The client mistakenly thought Compassion was an abortion facility. Nurse Kim examined her and really listened to her client. She also prayed with her client that she may have God's grace to help her make the right decision. The pregnant woman, who by now was six months along, sought out one more abortion facility—a hospital where she was again examined and booked for an appointment the next day. 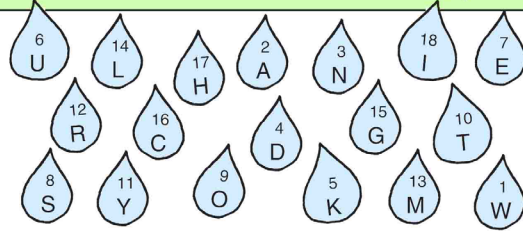
