DO NOT BE AFRAID...

...to go out on the streets and into public places, like the first Apostles who preached Christ and the Good News of salvation in the squares of cities, towns and villages. This is no time to be ashamed of the Gospel (cf. Rom 1:16). It is the time to preach it from the rooftops (cf. Mt 10:27). Do not be afraid to break out of comfortable and routine modes of living, in order to take up the challenge of making Christ known in the modern metropolis. It is you who must "go out into the byroads" (Mt 22:9) and invite everyone you meet to the banquet which God has prepared for his people. The Gospel must not be kept hidden because of fear or indifference. It was never meant to be hidden away in private. It has to be put on a stand so that people may see its light and give praise to our heavenly Father (cf. Mt 5:15-16). St John Paul.

On Oct. 30, Catholic parishes across the country will mark Priesthood Sunday in the same way they celebrate every Sunday – with the holy Eucharist.

For priests of the Archdiocese of Detroit, who on Sunday and every day of the week stand in persona Christi (in the "person of Christ") to offer the sacraments on behalf of the Catholic faithful, there's no better way to celebrate the gift

of the priesthood than by celebrating the Savior who gives it. Still, because God chooses human vessels to carry out His plans in the world, it is appropriate that Catholics across the archdiocese and the United States celebrate Priesthood Sunday each year to show their appreciation for the men who continue to say "yes" to God's calling.

The courage and generosity of priests, in giving of themselves in countless untold ways, is ever more important in today's Church. From attending to the practical needs of parishes and schools, giving of themselves through corporal and spiritual works of mercy, and dispensing God's grace through the sacraments, the ministry of a priest is irreplaceable. "The reasons for this celebration (of Priesthood Sunday) should be obvious. The number of priests per Catholic has declined over the past 40 years," says Archbishop John G. Vlazny, retired Archbishop of Portland, Ore. "Yet without a priest, no parish is able to be a Eucharistic community. It is important to reaffirm the importance of the priesthood of Jesus Christ and its central place in the life of our Church." For everything a priest does over the course of a year, Priesthood Sunday is a chance for parishioners to give back, whether through a simple "thank you," a gesture of appreciation or word of encouragement.

FR. RON'S RAMBLINGS

At 9:30 Mass this Sunday we celebrate the Rite of Acceptance into the Catechumenate. This is the second of four stages in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). The first stage is Inquiry, the second is Catechumenate, the third is Enlightenment, and the fourth is Mystagogy.

The RCIA is the process by which a non-baptized person is initiated in to the Christian community. In the past, here at St. Isidore and in most parishes, the RCIA (Catechumenate), has been a nine month process, beginning in September and ending with the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil. Most parishes have a nine-month program. However, the rite itself calls for the process to be year round. That is our goal at St. Isidore. Our Catechumenate Team, under RCIA Coordinator John Kovacic, has been working very hard over the past year to move to a year round process. This has involved several of the team members attending numerous classes and workshops in order to be certified for the RCIA. It takes a large, well trained team to lead a year round process. This is because several stages, with different participants, run simultaneously throughout the year.

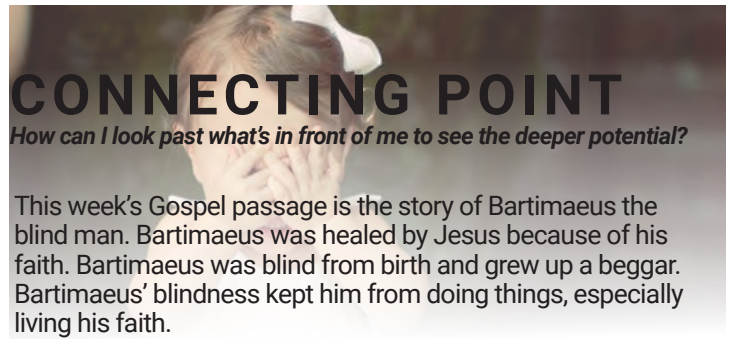
FR. RON'S RAMBLINGS

As it is now, if someone comes to us in January requesting to become Catholic, we have to tell them we will get back to them in September to begin the process. Obviously, this is not good! With the year round process, a person will be able to immediately enter into the Inquiry Stage, and then, when ready, enter the Catechumenate Stage with a group of peers. That group will be following a track other than the group accepted into the Catechumenate earlier, meeting at separate times with different catechists.

In the past, we celebrated the Rite of Acceptance only once a year, usually just before or at the beginning of the Advent Season. With our new process, we plan on celebrating the rite more than once a year. We will do so whenever new participants are ready. I strongly believe that a proper Catechumenate process can help transform a parish community.

I thank John Kovacik and his hardworking, dedicated team: Bernadette Kovacik, Ann De Rey, Beth Beebe, Matt Hunt, Tim Palmer, and Bill Hicks.

CONNECTING POINT

How can I look past what's in front of me to see the deeper potential?

Where will the trees be located?

There will be three trees located just inside the Romeo Plank & the 23 Mile entrances to the church.

Describe the Ornaments?

The ornaments will all be a "Christmas Giving Tree Envelope." The envelope will have the five families/agencies we are assisting listed on the envelope. All you need to do is place your gifts inside this envelope and check off the families/agencies you wish to help, seal the envelope and return it to church.

What do we give? Gift Certificates from \$5.00 to \$25.00 or cash.

How were the Gift Certificates received by the families/agencies last year?

Many families told us how much fun they had shopping for their own children (just like we do!) The agencies also appreciated the certificates, and were able to personalize the gifts more than we ever could.

Where should the Certificates be purchased?

We ask that you purchase them from the following stores - Kohls, J. C. Penney and Target. The above stores have been selected because they either have no food or a very limited selection, thus avoiding the temptation on the part of the families to purchase food instead of gifts.

When and how do we return the "Christmas Giving Tree Envelopes?"

Envelopes can be returned on the following dates before all Masses, Nov. 3-4, Nov. 10-11, Nov. 17-18 Nov. 24 - 25, and

final date for returns, Dec. 1& 2. Committee members will be at the entrances to the church with baskets waiting to collect the envelopes. Again, please place your gift certificates or money in the "Christmas Giving Tree Envelope," check off the families/agencies you want to support, seal and drop in a committee member's basket on any of the above dates.

When do the families/agencies receive their Christmas Gift?

Gifts will be distributed no later than December 14. This will give families time to shop and wrap their children's gifts.

Charities we support:

1. **Pope Francis Center (formerly Ss. Peter & Paul warming ctr.)**
The Warming Ctr. Provides drinks and food, use of a phone, and a place to have mail delivered. Showers and laundry service are available along with socks, underwear and other practical items. There are fifteen volunteers and six paid staff members. Once a week ,medical and nursing students provide care and blood pressure checks.
2. **Baby Pantry**
St. Isidore's Baby Pantry has provided diapers, formula and baby food for 20 + families this year and we are growing. We serve Macomb Twp and surrounding townships and cities.
3. **St. Isidore families**
These families live within our parish boundaries, who struggle to make ends meet. Now that Christmas is around the corner, they desperately need some extra help. Last year our Christmas Giving Tree helped families, adults and children with gift certificates. Hopefully we can do the same thing this year.
4. **Nativity Church**
Nativity Church, in Detroit, has been our sister church for many years. We have been helping them financially to sustain the parish and promote the Catholic Faith in and around them.
5. **St. Maximilian and St. Aloysius**
We also donate to these churches, to a lesser amount, depending on our Christmas Tree collection totals.

SACRED RELICS

Teaching and Exposition of Sacred Relics.

Date: November 14 // 6:30 PM

Location: St. Paul of Tarsus •
41300 Romeo Plank Rd, Clinton Twp.

Over 150 relics will be on display, some believed to be as old as 2000 years, including relics of St. Paul, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Maria Goretti, St. Thérèse of Lisieux, & St. Francis of Assisi. In addition, there will also be a piece of a veil which is believed to have belonged to Our Lady, and one of the largest remaining pieces of the True Cross in the world.

ST. ISIDORE GOING GREEN

St. Isidore is going "green." You may have noticed that the parking lot lights have all been changed over to LED lights. Not only do they do a better job of lighting, the cost is considerably less than the lighting we had been using. We are looking into other parts of the campus to improve the cost of lighting as well. Another focus is kitchens—social hall kitchen as well as the staff kitchen. Immediately we are switching from plastic and Styrofoam plates and cups to paper. But going "green" is more than paper in place of plastic. It is essentially a way of life; using materials that are biodegradable, recycling and/or repurposing materials. Paying attention to the types of fertilizer we use, the amount of water we use.

The Christian Service Commission is now a member of the Clinton River Watershed Council "Adopt a Stream" project. We have seen first-hand, that rivers and streams are now healthy. No plastic debris or cans can be found in the water. More importantly, we collected benthic macroinvertebrates (bugs) that live in the silt of the river bottom. The types of "bugs" found gave us an indication of the health of the stream. We were in that part of the Clinton River which flows through Wolcott Mill Metropark and found it to be very healthy and clean.

We at St. Isidore can and will do much more to ensure that our little part of the planet is taken care of and thrives. We will do all we can to make us as "green" as possible. Why are we doing this? First, from a human perspective, long after we are gone from this planet, our descendants will be living here. The condition of the planet in their time will be a reflection of how we cared for it in our time. Secondly, from a theological perspective, we read in Genesis 2:15, "The Lord God then took the man and settled him in the Garden of Eden, to cultivate it and care for it." This planet is not ours, but given to us by God to care for and nourish. Pope John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI and now Pope Francis have all said that we are responsible for the earth.

We have formed a small committee to guide the parish through this endeavor. We will keep you posted, and down the road hold a general meeting inviting all who are interested in helping our planet.

Fall Back and Home Safety

Daylight Savings Time ends at 2:00am on Sunday, November 4, 2018. With daylight saving time ending, everyone knows to turn clocks back an hour to the appropriate new time. But there's one more crucial task that should also be done with every anniversary of turning the clocks: changing the batteries in smoke alarms. Install smoke alarms in all sleeping rooms, hallways that lead to sleeping areas, basements and each additional level of your home. Smoke alarms should be mounted on the ceiling 4" from the wall; wall mounts should be 4-12" from the ceiling. Do not install near draft areas (windows, vents). Call your local fire department if you are unsure about placement.

If you didn't take advantage of the DEA's National Drug Take Back Day in October, it is also a good time to clean out your home medicine cabinet and take any unwanted or expired medication to your local police department for proper disposal.

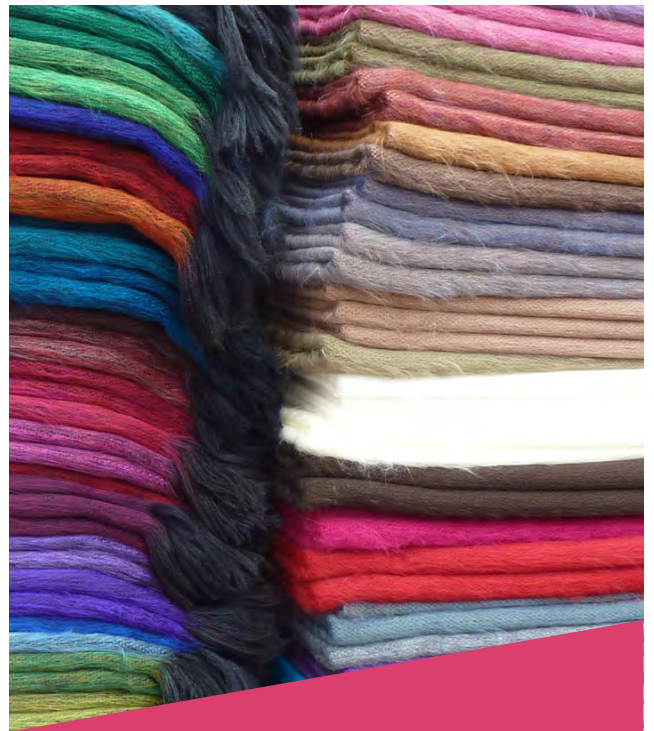

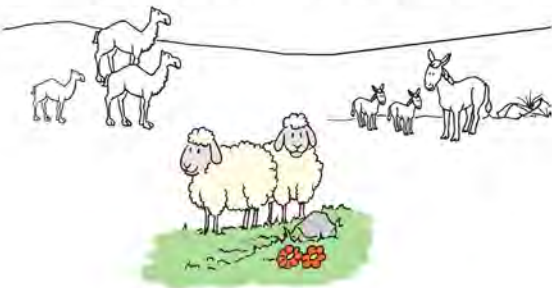
