FR. MARK'S MUSINGS

As some of you know, I have two homes really. Five days a week I live and work here at St. Isidore, and two days, usually Thursday and Friday, I am with my Jesuit brothers at UD Mercy in Detroit.

In my Jesuit community at UD Mercy, a big institutional house of about 20 guys, there are trivial issues that can drive us apart. Things like how strong we make the coffee, and what lights we turn on or off in our living room—perhaps not entirely unlike some of the trivial things that can make married life challenging. The sad thing, though, as one of my Jesuit brothers has very astutely observed, is that we are often unwilling, for various reasons, to even discuss these things as a community.

I encounter something similar here regarding more serious issues. The child abuse scandals and the MeToo movement have opened our eyes to abuse of

all kinds against children, women, and sometimes even men. Yet even now, I have discovered that there are some circumstances in which these issues cannot be discussed.

Issues that cannot be discussed break my heart, whether at my home here in Macomb or my home in Detroit. But in reflecting more on this, I have observed that if we are patient, something can happen that suddenly opens up the possibility of discussion.

In my Jesuit community, it was an email that our superior sent to all 20 of us, speaking of a certain malaise in our community. Myself and some others took offense at this remark, but the Jesuit I mentioned in the second paragraph saw an opportunity. He said, "Great, let's have the conversations that I've been wanting to have for the last 3 years!" I hope and pray that this happens.

There was a similar thing in recent world affairs. For at least a year and a half now, thousands of people have been starving in Yemen, while the country is being bombarded heavily by neighboring Saudi Arabia. But hardly anyone in the world seemed willing to even talk about this travesty. Then one thing happened that started to open people's eyes—the sensational story of Jamal Khashoggi, the man who was assassinated at the Saudi embassy in Turkey. Now, suddenly, some of our own congresspersons are talking about what's happening in Yemen, and our own complicity in it. Sadly, it took one high profile assassination to open the world's eyes to the plight of many thousands of ordinary poor people. Needless to say, there is a very long way to go to fully address this situation.

So, whether it is something happening in my own family or parish, or in our country or world, sometimes we have to look for those moments, and pray for the grace to seize upon those opportunities, when we can discuss the undiscussable.



CONNECTING POINT

What can I learn from the changing seasons?

Seasons remind us that change isn't bad, especially when we're prepared for it. Seasons are the epitome of predictable change. We know what kind of change to expect with seasons. Seasons remind us that there are rhythms to life, cycles of existence, and that we're closely connected to them.

The changing seasons bring new opportunities and new experiences, even as they may bring some new challenges. But the challenges of change usually come when change catches us off guard; like a winter storm without a snow shovel or a cold night before the firewood has been brought in.

But when we're well prepared change is something to look forward to. When the wood is gathered and the snow shovel is ready, the challenge of winter fades. It can even be fun if the sled is ready.

Seasons remind us that change is impossible to avoid. Change comes whether we like it or not. Change comes to our bodies and our families—and to our churches—as time goes by. Seasons remind us of the inevitability of change and the steady passage of time. Every season gives us a chance to change with it. It may be silly to leave our beach towels packed away and our winter coats on when summer comes.

And seasons remind us of the presence of powerful forces beyond our control. Seasons remind us that there is both mystery and order to the way the world works. Some of it we understand and some of it will always be too big for us. The order and predictability of the seasons is reassuring in a world that doesn't always make sense. The mystery and grandeur of seasonal change inspires a sense of awe and wonder.

33RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING

This Sunday is the second-to-last Sunday of our liturgical year. As we approach the end of the Church year, our Gospel invites us to consider Jesus' predictions and teaching about the end of the world. In Mark's Gospel, Jesus speaks to his disciples about this as he prepares them for his passion and death.

Before we consider Jesus' words, it is important to note the political backdrop against which many think Mark's Gospel was written. Most scholars concur that Mark wrote his Gospel for Christians living in or near Rome about 30 to 40 years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. This was a time of political turmoil in Rome. Some Christians, including many Jewish Christians, were persecuted during the reign during the reign of the emperor Nero (about 64 A.D.). At the same time in Palestine, Jewish revolutionariesrebelled against the Romans, which led the Romans to destroy the Temple in Jerusalem in 70 A.D. In this time of political turmoil and persecution, many in Mark's community might have wondered if the end times predicted by Jesus were in fact quite near.

Last Sunday, the end of chapter 12 in Mark, we heard Jesus' observation about the contributions being made to the temple treasury, and the example of sacrificial giving that he saw in the poor widow's offering. If we had been reading Mark's Gospel continuously, we would have heard Jesus predict the destruction of the Temple, his teaching about the costs of discipleship, and the woes that will accompany the end times. Finally, we would have heard Jesus instruct his disciples about the need for watchfulness so that they will not be caught unprepared for the day of judgment..

In today's passage near the end of chapter 13 in Mark, Jesus offers his disciples signs to look for that will indicate that the coming of the Son of Man is near. His words and images draw upon Old Testament imagery, especially images found in the Book of Daniel. Jesus then offers the lesson of the fig tree, which tells us that if we know how to read the signs, we can be prepared for the end times. However, Jesus also teaches that no one except the Father knows when the end time will come. In the verses that follow this reading in Mark's Gospel, Jesus continues to warn his disciples to be on watch for this end time.

Jesus' words are not spoken to frighten his disciples, nor should they frighten us. Rather, they are offered to prepare us for the changes we will experience during our lifetimes and at the end times. Our consolation and hope is found in the lasting nature of Jesus' words and God's never-ending love for us.
