

FR. MARK'S MUSINGS

Some of the most powerful prayers/reflections of the 20th Century have similar themes: serenity, patience, and humility. Some of these prayers will be familiar to you, but others may not be. All of them are worth praying and reflecting on over and over. I will give a brief background on most of these, and short passages from each. I strongly encourage you to read the entire texts of these, which you can easily find online or elsewhere.

The familiar "Prayer of St. Francis" was not actually written by St. Francis of Assisi, who lived in the 12-13th centuries, but rather by an unknown Frenchman. perhaps Franciscan Fr. Esther Bouquerel around the year 1912. The sentiments are consistent with those of St. Francis, but the prayer was written many centuries later. (Misattribution will be a frequent theme of my "Musings" today!) "Lord, make me an instrument of your peace; where there is hatred, let me sow love...Grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand...for it is in giving that we receive, ...and in dying that we are born to eternal life."

Reinhold Niebuhr, an American Reformed theologian, wrote the Serenity Prayer around 1930. It has become a standard. especially in the Alcoholics Anonymous movement: "Lord, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference." The prayer continues for several sentences beyond this, but this is the best-known part. I have come to see "serenity, courage, and wisdom" as a great synopsis of the Holy Spirit's gifts for myself.

Mother Teresa said, "We can do no great things, only small things with great love." However, God certainly did great things through her. She was truly an instrument of God's peace. This one sentence captures much of her humility and serenity. accepting our human limitations.

A man named Kent Keith at Harvard University wrote The Paradoxical Commandments in 1968, in a Handbook for Student Leaders. This reflection was a favorite of Mother Teresa, and has often been incorrectly attributed to her. Keith says, "People are illogical, unreasonable, and self-centered; love them anyway... The biggest men and women with the biggest ideas can be shot down by the smallest men and women with the smallest minds; think big anyway. People favor underdogs, but follow only top dogs; fight for a few underdogs anyway..." While there is a certain defiance in this reflection, it is really about serenity, the peace of mind that comes from doing the right thing without worrying about approval or disapproval, and leaving the success or failure to God.

There are two powerful reflections that speak especially of the virtue of patience. Both were written by Catholic priests, one probably in the first half of the 20th Century, the one well into the second half.

The first was written by the Jesuit philosopher, paleontologist, and mystic Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, who died in 1955. He wrote many philosophical works, and has many great guotes. His most famous prayer is sometimes called Patient Trust. It was given to me by a spiritual director, a religious sister, at a difficult but pivotal time in my life. "Above all, trust in the slow work of God. We are impatient to reach the end without delay, to skip the intermediate stages... It is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stage of instability and that it may take a very long time... Your ideas mature gradually—let them grow, let them shape themselves...Accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete."

One of our own Archdiocese of Detroit priests, who later became bishop of Saginaw, the late Ken Untener, wrote a reflection in 1979 on the themes of patience and humility. It is called "Prophets of a Future Not Our Own." This prayer too has been incorrectly attributed, to another bishop, the recently canonized Oscar Romero. But Bishop Untener was certainly a holy man in his own right, renowned for his preaching and the care of his flock.

How can I allow the power of the Spirit to be my strength?

We need to be open to God's word and immerse ourselves in his message of service for others. St. Theresa of Avila, in a prayer attributed to her, said, "Christ has no body but yours, no hands, no feet on earth but yours." In today's world we draw strength from the understanding that "We are the Body of Christ." It is important to understand that the Spirit is God's strength and light is in us. The Holy Spirit calls us to work together and share our strengths as we endeavor to build the Kingdom of God.

BE SAFE SHOVELING SNOW

We all know winter is far from over here in Michigan. As important as it is to clear your driveways and walkways to prevent slips and falls, it's equally important to follow some basic safety tips when shoveling, or even using your snow blower

- 1. If you are inactive or have a history of cardiac disease, diabetes or high blood pressure, consult your physician before shoveling snow.
- 2. Begin shoveling slowly to avoid putting a sudden demand on your heart.
- 3. Wear a mask or scarf to help warm the air to your lungs.
- 4. Avoid nicotine and caffeine before shoveling, as these stimulants place extra stress on the heart.
- 5. Follow work/rest cycles that allow you to spend some time in a warm shelter. Rest periods have an additional benefit of helping you to avoid fatigue and overuse injuries
- 6. Remember to warm up and cool down to decrease the chance of muscle injury. Use good body mechanics, bend from the knees and hips, lift with your legs, and don't twist your torso. Whenever possible, push rather than lift the snow. When choosing a snow shovel, look for one that is lightweight and has a bent-handle to allow you to be more upright.

POPE'S MONTHLY PRAYER INTENTION // JANUARY

That young people, especially in Latin America, follow the example of Mary and respond to the call of the Lord to communicate the joy of the Gospel to the world.



St. Isidore does a lot to reach out to those in need both locally and beyond. The following is a letter of gratitude from The Mission of DB Peru, a group that provides access to healthcare knowledge and delivery, and improving living conditions of the people of Peru.

I would like to share about our work resulting from a grant with St. Isidore Church for our midwife education.

We used initial monies for our Advanced Midwife Class September 29 and 30 in the local village of San Pedro on the lower Napo River in the Peruvian Amazon. We invited only previous participants from our other classes who had had at least 15 years of midwife experience.

A strong focus was placed on coaching and preparing the first-time mother for the birth process, which was named as the number one risk in labor and delivery that was identified by midwives in our previous classes. We also gave out a medication misoprostol to be used in bleeding emergencies. Written material was given for dosage and side effects.

The midwives came away from the class feeling as if they knew a great deal more about how to proceed when there are problems.

We feel our classes are extremely important as there is no government oversight or education for lay midwives available. And even though we all agree that having a baby in a clinic or health post is ideal, traveling to that clinic in an open canoe for several hours or more is not the ideal place to be going through the labor process or possibly delivering a baby. Having trained lay midwives available in the villages is the safest way for mothers to be checked prenatally and available to assist safely with births, especially those that have problems.

For 2019 we will be using the remaining monies from the grant for a class for new midwives, with the experienced ones on board to teach. Please convey our appreciation to St. Isidore Church for once again supporting our work in this remote area.

IRA ROLLOVER

Per the Archdiocese of Detroit: IRA Rollover

Over 70-and-a half? What you need to know about the IRA charitable gift rollover.

Congress has extended and the president has signed the favorable IRA charitable rollover tax provisions for 2015 and made them permanent for future years. What should a donor over age 70½ do in order to get the benefit that IRA distributions will not be included in taxable income? Donors should follow the same general procedures for IRA charitable distributions as in the past —

- Only direct distributions to charity up to \$100,000 qualify as tax-free. Distributions in exchange for a charitable gift annuity or to a charitable remainder trust do not qualify.
- It is especially important that the IRA distribution be made payable to the charity, not to you as the IRA owner and beneficiary. Otherwise, the distribution would not qualify for the favorable tax treatment. Advise your IRA administrator to make the distribution check payable to the Church or other charity, not to you.
- Only distributions from traditional or certain Roth IRAs are tax-free; the law does not apply to other qualified retirement plans, such as 401(k) plans. However, you should consider consulting with your financial or tax advisor about the possibility of transferring funds from one of these other qualified plans to establish an IRA, with the distribution to charity coming from the newly established IRA.
- Consult with your IRA administrator and tax advisor on the proper procedures for making a direct distribution to St. Isidore, the Archdiocese of Detroit Endowment Foundation, the Catholic Services Appeal, Sacred Heart Major Seminary, Catholic Charities of Southeast Michigan, or another archdiocesan institution or qualified charity.

A special note from St. Isidore: We thank the many parishioners who use this type of distribution to generously support the parish. We are blessed by this act of generosity. St. Isidore will work to the best of our ability to track IRA distributions that come directly to the parish, but most often these distributions come in anonymously. Please contact our Business Manager, Chris Kozlowski (chris@stisidore.church or 586-745-9514) with any questions on how your distribution is being recorded.

Untener wrote, "The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision. We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work... No prayer fully expresses our faith...No program accomplishes the Church's mission...We plant the seeds that one day will grow...We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker."

Summing up these great prayers, God wants to do great things through us—things that will make a difference in our families, our communities, our church, our nation, and our world. But it takes humility, serenity, and patience for God to bring the work he has begun in us to completion.

THE GIFT OF TIME

Too many of our older and disabled neighbors are lonely and isolated. They long for just a brief visit now and then from someone who will take the time to sit and chat, and other families in our community are struggling to take care of a loved one at home. For these full-time caregivers, a break to run errands, go to their own doctor appointments, or just relax for an hour is often impossible because their parent or spouse cannot be left alone.

If you have a few hours, once or twice a month, to visit or just sit with an older or disabled adult, your gift of time will make a huge difference for our lonely and struggling neighbors. No hands-on care or nursing experience is needed.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

JANUARY 18-25, 2019

Last week Pope Francis and the Church celebrated the annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity beginning with the celebration of evening Vespers in the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls.

The joint celebration that kicks off the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is a powerful symbol of unity and of the recognition that Christian denominations are on the path to unity and getting closer in doctrine.

The Week of Prayer, traditionally observed from January 18 to 25 January, unfolds this year on the theme "Justice, and only justice, you shall pursue" inspired by Deuteronomy. Pope Francis looked ahead to the Week of Prayer during the Wednesday General Audience saying that "Again, this year we are called to pray so that all Christians may once again be a single family, according to God's will 'so that they may all be

He pointed out that "ecumenism is not something optional" and said it aims "to develop a common and consistent witness that promotes true justice and support for the weakest through responses that are concrete, appropriate and effective."

Daniel Reffner, a United Methodist candidate for the ordained

ministry from the United States, spoke to Linda Bordoni about his experience studying ecumenism at Bossey and about how it has changed his perspective.

Daniel said he believes this week is important because it is the symbol of the heart of ecumenism, of bringing people together despite their different backgrounds "saying that although we don't agree on everything, it really is important to the Christian witness to show signs of unity." Personally, he said it is important, within the course he is part of, "to seek that unity alongside the 28 other people that I have been walking through this program with, from different backgrounds and who believe in different things on some Christian doctrines; and yet, we believe that it is important that we are in relationship, both for one another and for our love for God."

He remarked on Pope Francis' own witness and promotion of Christian Unity and said the very presence of the Bossey students in Rome for a week was sponsored and supported by the Vatican Council for Promoting Christian Unity: "a sign that the Vatican supports our work and we feel that support."






