FR. RON'S REFLECTION


Happy Mother's Day to all mothers of our parish, and to those who share motherly love with our young people, such as aunts, teachers, coaches, mentors, counselors, etc.

In many ways, a mother's love is the most challenging of all forms of human love. We often talk about how in marriage two become one, as husband and wife, centering their lives on each other. With a mother's love, it is in some ways the opposite that takes place: what was one is allowed to become two. The mother, who was literally one with her child physically and emotionally, allows the child to separate from her and become their own independent person. A pure mother loves the child unconditionally and wants nothing in return except the happiness of the one loved. She does not expect the child's gratitude, just their happiness. It is extremely difficult to let the child go. Yet, that is a mother's

In recent months two of my nieces, both of whom grew up and received all of their sacraments at St. Isidore, celebrated the birth of their first child. In each case, I have beautiful pictures of them holding their newborn child for the first time. The babies are extremely fragile. The mothers are obviously overcome with joy and pride. Their eyes are filled with tenderness and love. In sending the pictures, my nieces revealed the names by which they are calling their children: Olivia and Alexandra. They chose these names very carefully, and will surely never forget them.

In many ways, these pictures reflect the beautiful stained glass window of the Good Shepherd in our worship space. (This window is somewhat hidden in the corner on the west side of the church to the right of the wall on which the tapestries are hung). The shepherd is holding the fragile lamb with the same loving and tender expression on his face as is on the faces of the new mothers. It is clear that a mother's love is very much like the love of the Good Shepherd. Jesus, our Good Shepherd, values us and takes delight in us. He knows us and calls us by name. He is committed to protecting us and keeping us safe. As a mother would leave all else to go in search of a child who has become lost in any way, the Good Shepherd will go in search of a lost sheep. A mother pours out her life for the child, just as the Good Shepherd on the cross pours out his life for his flock. A child will always recognize its mother's voice, as we recognize our Shepherd's voice.

It is by happy coincidence that this year Mother's Day falls on the Fourth Sunday of Easter, also known as "Good Shepherd Sunday." I am sure you can think of many other ways in which a mother's love is like the love of the Good Shepherd. Praise God!

The Church in Africa, a Seed of Unity

That the Church in Africa, through the commitment of its members, may be the seed of unity among her peoples and a sign of hope for this continent.



Although it was declared eliminated from the United States in 2000, measles has rocketed back into the public eye in recent years following several well-publicized instances of localized outbreaks, including current news stories about new cases in surrounding counties.

What are the Measles? Measles, also called rubeola, is a highly contagious acute respiratory viral illness. Infections due to measles have been declining since the development of a vaccine in the early 1960s, but recently there have been several outbreaks throughout the United States in areas where vaccination rates have fallen.

What symptoms should people look for? After exposure, the measles incubation period is around one to two weeks. During this time, the infected person will show no symptoms. As the disease begins to manifest, the initial symptoms of measles include the "three Cs" – cough, coryza (runny nose), and conjunctivitis (pink eye). Once these symptoms begin to wane, a high fever and splotchy red rash appears on the face spreading to the trunk and arms. The infection can last two to three weeks, but the contagious period is anywhere from about four days before to four days after the rash appears.

If symptoms develop, DO NOT visit your doctor or emergency room unless you call ahead so they can take precautions to prevent exposure to other individuals.

How common is it? Measles remains a relatively uncommon infection in the United States thanks to the availability of a highly effective vaccination. In the last two decades, the number of patients per year infected with measles in the US has averaged between around 60 and 100 cases. However, due to declining vaccine rates, the number of cases in recent years has jumped to more than 200 per year.

Why is it coming back? Every measles outbreak that has occurred in the US in the last decade has been the direct result of either an unvaccinated traveler or a community of persons with low vaccination rates. Fears of the possible effects of the vaccine have led many to avoid vaccinating their children against measles, and unfortunately many countries outside the US still do not routinely have access to measles vaccination.

Who is most susceptible, and why? Is it worse at any particular

age? The ones most susceptible to complications from measles are those who are very young, very old, and those who have compromised immune systems from certain medications or medical conditions. For medical reasons, people with severely compromised immune systems are unable to receive the vaccine. They rely upon the "herd immunity" of the population to keep them protected. As the rate of vaccination in a community begins to decline, the "herd" is no longer protected, and those who are at greatest risk of complications are potentially exposed.

How is it treated? There is no antiviral therapy available for the measles. Treatment consists of supportive care, fever-reducing medications like acetaminophen and ibuprofen, and drinking plenty of fluids to keep from getting dehydrated.


How can people avoid getting the measles? Vaccination is the best defense against contracting the measles. The vaccine is routinely given to children beginning at 12 to 15 months, with a second dose given between 4 and 6 years of age. People born before 1957 are presumed to be immune to measles, but those born during or after 1957 without evidence of immunity should get at least one dose of vaccination. If a person is uncertain whether they are immune or not, a blood test performed by their physician can show if they have immunity or not.

Are there any misconceptions about the disease? First, complications from measles infection are more common than many people think. Even in healthy children, measles can cause serious illness requiring hospitalization. About one out of every 1,000 persons infected with measles will develop acute encephalitis (inflammation of the brain), or possibly die from respiratory and neurologic complications.

Second, getting vaccinated is not just providing protection for you; it's also providing protection for the people in the community that are most vulnerable (the very young, the very old, and immunocompromised individuals, etc.) and rely upon herd immunity to remain safe.

It is widely accepted that the risk of potential complications from measles infection far outweighs the very minor risk of side effects from the vaccination itself.
